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## Letter, 1861 June 15, Oscar D. Ladley to Mother and Sisters [Catherine, Mary, and Alice Ladley]

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At 1 Philippi va June 15th. 1861.
Dear mother and Listers,
I have been lotking for a letter from you for a long time both have received but one since & Came Into This state and that was forwared from Bellair, & have written several to you but you may not have received all of them. There are a great many betters come into camp but none for me, you must know that our advantages for writing is very poor and we have very little line to write as there is a greatdeal of guard duty to be performed here, and as we are the best drilled company on the ground and of course we have the worke to do, we have been the advanced guard cofar with one of the bergenia confanie under Capt, Fordice who lest the advance when the attack was made on this place, he is a regular dance. devil, and cares for nothing, the cores was by the side of Col. Kelly when he was shot, and he with his me arrested Simms the assassin. I sufose you have read of the farticulars of the Skermish. Last week myself and De Saurance guarde Semms and the Algro who killed one of his own color at the time, they are both wicked looking fellows, they were shiped to Wheeling a few days ago. Last night about three O' Clock we were aroused from our slumbers by the Cry to arms as the Picketts guards had fireed.

their gans and run in to camp reporting that we were about to be attacted from all sides by a superior force of Rebbels, we were under arms and ready in about five or ten minutes after the alarm were posted at the tridge that was occupied by the secissionists when they were here, we remained under arms until daylight and not hearing any further alarm we went tack to quarters, The think there is no fears of them coming tack, it would look more like them to see them makeing tracks the other way This is the fourth time that we have been called out, and every Time we expected a fight - Fur Company has held the pash of honor all the way into this state so fan, and have been doing double our share of duty since coming here. I would like very much to hear from your oftener than I have, if we were settled I could write more frequent than I have, I heard through one of the boys that our house had been troken into, there was no particulars about it and I did not Know what to make of it, let me know the particular, The boys are all well, contilin is a little un well to day. He have just got orders to move over the river this after noon, sothing more to day. Write soon and a good long one sive my love to all. go half starred It is no wonder that the men are so reductand to enlish for three years, I would not go for any thing if I had to entest live as we do.
