Writing Across the Curriculum Committee: Joe Law, WAC Chair, reported that the committee has approved ENG 341 as an advanced writing course.

University General Education Committee: Henry Limouze, UGEC Chair, reported that the committee is working on putting in place assessment plans for Areas III and VI and examining the teaching composition of GE courses. On the latter, it appears that there has been a decline in the proportion of tenured and tenure track faculty teaching GE and an increase in the proportion of adjuncts, instructors, and lectures teaching GE. * The committee approved the LC proposals subject to the resubmission of course proposal syllabuses that meet required university standards, including a topical outline of course material coverage by weekly meetings, among other things. In addition, the committee requested that the title for student record on many courses be revised to conform with university requirements. Student Government argued that the 94% bar for an "A" and overall grading scale on course syllabuses was too high relative to what was believed to be the more standard 90% bar and so-called 10% grading scale used at the main campus, although the committee did not support any change in course grading scales.

The faculty of the COSM since met with the faculty of the CECS and both came to agreement that MTH 233 and MTH 253 will be replaced by a 4-5 credit hour integrated course to be developed in the near future. The proposal (indicating such agreement) is available as follows:

B.S. Electrical Engineering. The proposal was previously tabled at the UCAPC meetings of March 11 and April 12. At the present meeting it was announced that the COSM and the CECS did not come to mutual agreement on the proposed resubmission whereby MTH 233 and MTH 253 would be replaced by a 4-5 hour integrated course. A problem pointed out by committee members was the deletion of MTH 233 from the proposed program. Therein was a problem in that, unlike the Industrial and Systems Engineering proposal, entering students would not be required to take MTH 233 under the proposed new program. After much discussion, a motion was made to approve the proposal. Absent a second to the motion, the motion was not supported and could not be considered by the committee. Once again, the committee remained confident that, as with the above program changes, the COSM and the CECS will continue to work together and the final product will enhance the WSU curriculum. 1. Minutes from March 4 were approved.
2. The committee considered the proposal for SM 205, which addressed only the WI status of the course. The question was raised whether the course had been approved by GEIC earlier. It appears it had not been. In that case, CoSM will need to submit a full GE Course Proposal. Action was tabled pending submission of a full course proposal.
3. The committee accepted the proposals from CoLA to withdraw SW 272 from GE Area 2 (it will remain a course in Area 6) and to withdraw SOC 205 from GE Areas 3 and 6. These will be forwarded to UCAPC.
4. The committee considered the assessment proposal for Area 4—Human Expression received from Joe Law and Randall Paul and tabled at the last meeting. The committee will send recommendations for improvements to Dr. Law and Dr. Paul. The discussion included consideration of a structure for conducting assessment that the committee may adopt for all areas.
5. The committee considered the assessment proposal for Area 5—Natural Sciences received from Tim Wood. The committee will send recommendations for improvements to Dr. Wood.
6. The committee postponed action on the revised plan for Area 1—Writing received from Richard Bullock. This plan will be considered at the next UGEC meeting.
7. The committee heard a report from Dr. Ed Rutter on the situation of MTH 145 and other GE Math courses relative to the Ohio Transfer Module. The solution adopted by Vice President Howard, Dean Wheatly, and the Department of Mathematics and Statistics will be to withdraw MTH 145 and 143 and STT 264 from consideration for the transfer module. Currently MTH 228 and 230 and STT 265 are approved for this purpose. Dr. Rutter is confident that with some revision STT 160 would also receive approval. The committee discussed the need to revise the presentation of GE courses in each area. The current system, which lists a "standard" GE course and places "substitutions" for that course in footnotes, no longer reflects the reality of the GE program structure. However, the committee will maintain that format for the time being, while it solicits and evaluates assessment plans from area lead faculty which have been based on the older assumptions. Over time, a more flexible listing of course alternatives within each area of GE will replace the current approach.
8. The committee discussed further the question of GE staffing. It will consider a draft recommendation on staffing issues at the next meeting.

3. The committee considered the revised assessment proposal for Area 1—Writing received from Richard Bullock. The committee agreed to accept this proposal while encouraging the writing program to continue to fine tune the proposal as it conducts its first program assessment using the proposed plan.
4. The committee considered a draft statement on GE staffing issues. The committee recommended several changes to this draft, making the statement more specific, more focused and more forceful in its charge to the university. A revised statement will be made available to the committee before the next meeting.

Memorandum

As requested here is a memorandum explaining the rationale for all of the curricular changes being submitted to the College Curriculum Committee.

1) Number changes for a variety of courses.

Due to the large number of classes for which the Department of Music is submitting only a listing of number changes, the Department is following procedures as specified by the WSU Registrar. The rationale is simply to save paperwork.

These changes are being made for several reasons:

- a) Music Ensembles are being changed from a MUS prefix to a MUE prefix. This will allow a transcript to be read with greater clarity. Similar to a MUA for Applied Music, MUE will clearly delineate ensembles.
- b) The Department of Music typically cross-lists graduate and undergraduate classes. This occurs essentially with entry-level graduate curricula and upper level undergraduate curricula. University policy states that 300 level classes cannot be cross-listed with 700 classes (the current numbers and procedures). The proposed changes therefore are in accordance with university policy and also better reflect the curricular level of the course content.

2) Several new courses are being proposed.

These include:

- a) An expansion of ensemble offerings
- b) New curricula required for teaching licensure
- c) Changing undergrad topics and titles to fit with graduate offerings (necessitated by undergraduate curriculum for BM in Performance)

3) Deletion of classes no longer offered.

- a) Ensembles no longer offered
- c) Deletion of classes caused by the creation of new classes described in Number 2 above.

4) The curriculum change for the BM in Music Education reflects changes that have been mandated by the Ohio Board of Regents and the curricular reactions to these changes by the Department of Music and the College of Education and Human Services.

What is the Honors Program?

The Honors Program for the Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation provides students of exceptional ability enrolled in academic programs in the department an opportunity for creativity, self-direction, and excellence through an extended period of independent study under the guidance of interested faculty. While this program does not require students to complete the University Honors Program, students are encouraged to do so.

When is it offered?

Upon Approval from the appropriate University committees.

Who is eligible?

Junior or Senior students who have maintained a 3.0 cumulative average, a 3.0 cumulative in department content courses, and are enrolled in the College of Education and Human Services, may apply for the Honors Program in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Transfer students are required to maintain a 3.0 cumulative average for the first 30 credit hours of work at Wright State University. Under unusual conditions, transfer students may petition the Honors Committee for admission to the Honors Program in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation before 30 credit hours of work have been completed.

What are the prerequisites?

Junior standing is a prerequisite for entering the Honors Program. The nature of the student's honors project may require additional prerequisite courses. This is to be determined by the student's honor advisor in consultation with the honors coordinator.

What does the program consist of?

In essence, it is an honors project, a Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Honors Seminar, and one or more University Honors Seminars.

Students will complete an honors project under the guidance of a faculty advisor.

- a. The student will enroll for two successive quarters in HPR 400, for a total of six hours. If the nature of the project is such that it requires more than two academic

- quarters for work, the student, with the approval of the honors advisor and the honors coordinator, may enroll in this course for an additional three credit hours.
- b. The honors project may deal with any topic or problem related to health, physical education, athletic training, and sports medicine. The project may take on the character of library research, fieldwork, development of curriculum materials, study of classroom strategies, or any facet of the general area in which the student is interested. The students are encouraged to do interdisciplinary work involving two or more program areas within the College of Education and Human Services or the assistance of another department within the university.

How will participants be evaluated?

When the project is completed, the student will prepare both a written and oral presentation.

- a. A committee composed of the honors coordinator, the faculty members of the Honors Committee, and the student's honors advisor, will evaluate the project. Faculty from other departments of the university may be asked to join the evaluation committee on a consulting basis whenever the nature of the project involves extensive work in that department.
- b. The project will be assigned a grade according to the majority of the Evaluation Committee. To receive honors credit, a grade of A is required. A student, whose work is evaluated as B or C, shall receive credit only. The student may request time to do additional work and a second evaluation to elevate a grade of B or C to A. Arrangements for a second evaluation must be made within two weeks of the first evaluation. Such arrangements will include proposed changes and a time line for completion. These arrangements must be made with the approval of the honors coordinator. Only one reevaluation will be permitted.
- c. Students who do not complete the project will be evaluated by their advisor on the work completed and they will be granted three credit hours if the work is satisfactory. These are not honors credits and are not applicable to future honors work.
- d. Oral presentation of honors is open to both faculty and students.

How do honor credits fit into the regular program?

Credits earned through the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Honors Program are considered electives in the student's total program.

What is needed to graduate with honors in education?

At the time of graduation, the student must present:

1. An overall cumulative average of 3.0.
2. A cumulative average of 3.0 in professional content courses.
3. An honors project evaluated with a grade of “A”.
4. Credit in one or more University Honors Seminars.

How does one get into the program?

The student must submit an application and a letter of recommendation from a faculty member of the program area in which they plan to work to the Honors Committee for approval.

1. **Rationale for the new major:**

Through various forms of surveys, visits, word-of-mouth and formal discussions, a need for a new major with a focus on Information Technology became evident. After several meetings with personnel in this industry, a focus of graphic design and web development began to emerge. An advisory group was formed with instructors, students, and personnel from the local industries that provided guidance and direction throughout the development of this major. Several new industries have emerged in the Mercer/Auglaize county area needing trained graduates in graphic design. Many have had to obtain graduates from cities outside the area or even outside the state.

2. **Benefits of the new major:**

Due to the fact that several industries in the area have recently established a graphic design business, students will be able to obtain full-time employment in this field. In addition, internships have been established with area publishing companies, which will provide students with on-the-job experience, which will lead into a full-time position upon completion of the internship and graduation from the program. Wright State University—Lake Campus will benefit because it will become the leader in the technology field. The university will be providing a much-needed service to area graphic organizations. It is evident that the area publishing and design companies will benefit by having highly trained students ready to become employed and productive in the graphics field.

- ◆ **Job Opportunities** – Graphic Designers, Graphic Assistants, Desktop Publishers, Web Site Designers
- ◆ **Licensure/Certifications** – Graduates completing the program are eligible to complete the MOS—Microsoft Office Specialist Certification Program in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Access, Outlook, and FrontPage. In addition the Adobe Corporation has certification components that graduates may complete. These certifications will enhance the students’ job opportunities. Wright State University—Lake Campus has already been recognized as an official testing center for these exams.
