Letter, 1863 April 26, Oscar D. Ladley to Mother and Sisters [Catherine, Mary, and Alice Ladley]

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Brookes Station, Va.
Sunday, April 26th 1863.

Dear Mother & Sisters,

I received your kind letter this evening and hasten to answer. The slip of paper and pepper come safe, and if necessary will profit by the instructions.

You say you feel bad because you have to use my money to pay that note. Don't worry on that account. What is mine is for the good of you all, and when you need any thing don't be afraid to use it.

The indications are that we will move in the morning, but do not know where to. If it is for the purpose of attacking the rebels we shall not have to go far, but if it is ~~the~~^a strategic movement, we may have considerable marching to do. Every man has to carry eight days rations, five in the knapsack, and three

in haversack, one extra shirt and pair
of stockings. You see we are prepared
for something. The whole Army has the
same orders. This letter may not reach
you, but I will write as if it would.
The mails as I understand have
stopped going out but they still
come in. I got the paper, Franklin's

I am sorry that there is a slim prospect
for a school, I had hoped that you
would be able to get one this Spring,
but it seems that luck or something
is against you. But keep your eyes
open and do the best you can.
Do you know it all do you? I hope
there is nothing wrong with what I
done. The boys are keeping up quite
a noise to night, setting fire to old
tents and burning all useless articles
generally. It is always the case on the
eve of a march. Well I will close,
