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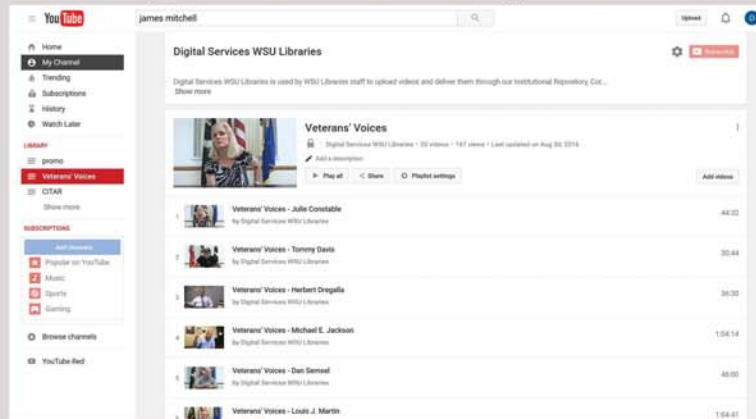
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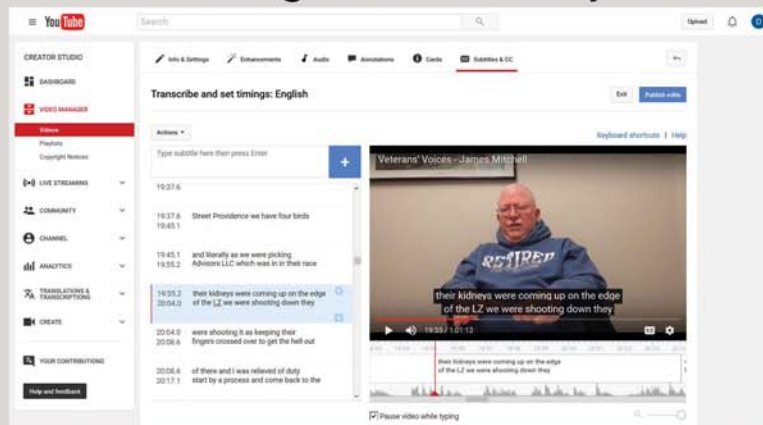
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Management and Storage of Videos



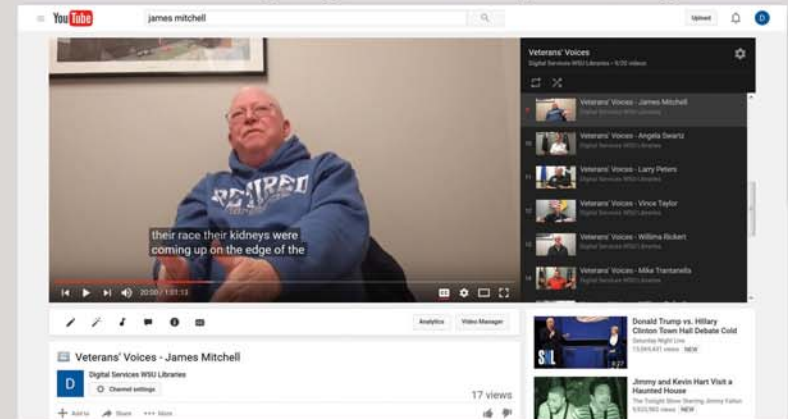
YouTube allows us to store videos and provides tools to easily manage our content. All videos are hosted on YouTube, but only accessible via a direct link or through our repository. Back-ups of every video are stored on a local server.

Correcting Auto-Transcriptions



Transcribers are able to edit small chunks of the auto-captioned transcript while watching the corresponding section of the video. Depending on the accuracy of the auto-captioning, this transcription can range from correcting spelling of local names and places, to rewriting whole sections of the transcript.

Leveraging Auto-Captioning



YouTube provides an auto-captioning tool that provides a great foundation for writing transcripts, however, the quality of the audio and nuances with each speaker minimize the accuracy of the auto-captioning.

Publishing Accessible Version



Once all transcripts are corrected using YouTube's transcription tools, the transcript is published and is now accessible as closed captioning on the video. The transcript is also downloaded from YouTube, saved on our servers, and added to our IR as a downloadable file.

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
