✓ The Paul Laurence Dunbar Library's Department of Archives and Special Collections houses one of the world's most complete repositories of original documents, memorabilia and personal photographs from the Wright brothers.

✓ The university's Ervin J. Nutter Center, completed in 1990, provides seating for up to 13,000 spectators for events ranging from basketball games and entertainment to conferences and commencements. It is home to the WSU athletics department and sports medicine facilities.

✓ Wright State University offers the nation's longest running aerospace medicine residency program for civilians.

✓ Over 80 percent of WSU's 700 faculty members hold advanced degrees.

✓ Almost 60,000 students have graduated from Wright State since 1964, with nearly half of them remaining in the greater Dayton area.

✓ Nearly 2,200 of Wright State's students live in university-affiliated residences on or adjacent to the 557-acre main campus.

✓ An extensive underground tunnel system links most WSU main campus buildings, whose modern architecture is nationally recognized for being completely accessible to people with disabilities.

✓ Although most WSU students hold jobs on or off campus, many are involved in one or more of the 100 student clubs and organizations that give vibrancy to campus life.

✓ The university offers 14 Division I intercollegiate athletic programs and many students participate in the intramural sports programs.

RAIDER SOFTBALL

✓ Wright State's 33 wins in 1999 was the most ever in a season for a Raider softball team.

✓ The Raiders have posted winning seasons in two of the last three years after not doing so since 1985.

✓ Wright State will have a great deal of experience on its roster in 2000 with 14 letterwinners and all 10 starters returning.

✓ Twenty-two all-conference honors have been awarded to Wright State players since 1994 and three players have been named to the MCC's All-Tournament Team.

✓ While most of Wright State's players come from Ohio, two California players were named to the MCC's All-Newcomer Team last season in Amber Kolle and Julia Tamai.

✓ Two of this season's home softball games will be broadcast locally on Time Warner Channel 30, which reaches an estimated 300,000 homes in the Dayton area.

✓ Wright State annually plays a tough schedule as the Raiders have faced such teams as DePaul, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Illinois-Chicago, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Northern Illinois, Notre Dame, Northwestern, Ohio State, Penn State, Princeton, Purdue, South Carolina, Tennessee and Utah over the years.

Eighth Year

The Wright State softball program continues to grow under eighth-year head coach Sheila Nahrgang.

WSU posted its most wins ever in a season in 1999 and was prominent in the national rankings as the Raiders were 19th in Division I in slugging percentage, 20th in batting average, 28th in double plays turned per game, 30th in stolen bases per game and 35th in triples per game.

Last season comes on the heels of two milestone seasons before that. The Raiders finished third in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference in 1998, the highest ever by a Wright State softball team, and in 1997, Wright State compiled a winning season for the first time since 1985.

Prior to coming to WSU, Nahrgang played for two seasons at Creighton University with both of those teams finishing runner-up in the NCAA regionals. She also played one season at the University of Nebraska-Omaha and coached an 18 and under fastpitch "Elite" team in Omaha for one year.

A native of East Moline, Illinois, and a graduate of United Township High School, Nahrgang played on three Illinois high school championship teams and was a four-year letterwinner in softball and a three-year letterwinner in volleyball. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in business from Wilberforce University in 1994.

Second Year

Nicole Plugger returns for her second season on the Wright State coaching staff after spending six seasons as part of the University of Toledo's softball program.

A four-year letterwinner for Toledo from 1993-96, Plugger was a three-year starter at shortstop for the Rockets and ranks among the school leaders in several categories. She is second in school history in home runs with eight and fifth in doubles with 29. She is also fifth all-time in fielding assists with 430 and is in the Top 15 in games played (200), at bats (557), triples (5) and runs batted in (56).

Plugger was part of the Toledo coaching staff for two seasons, serving as an assistant in 1998 after being a graduate assistant in 1997.

A native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, Plugger earned four letters in softball and swimming and two in volleyball at Northview High School. She earned a bachelor of arts degree in commercial recreation from Toledo in 1997.

Wright State University

In the tradition of the nation's best universities, Wright State University is dedicated to teaching, research, and service. In addition, Wright State has the distinct mission of providing leadership to improve the quality of life for the people of the Miami Valley. Wright State is an affordable, comprehensive, state university with a diverse range of high-quality academic programs and strong links to Miami Valley schools and business, government, and community organizations.

The university serves nearly 16,000 students with programs leading to more than 100 undergraduate and 40 graduate and professional degrees through six colleges and three schools. Wright State offers innovative educational programs, including doctoral programs in biomedical sciences, human factors and industrial/organizational psychology, medicine, and professional psychology; one of only two aerospace medicine residency programs for civilians in the nation; and a post-master's educational specialist degree program. Wright State's theatre, accounting, chemistry, geology, and engineering programs are recognized for excellence. The WSU Lake Campus near St. Marys and Celina, Ohio, offers associate and pre-baccalaureate degrees.

Wright State University's faculty is dedicated not only to advancing the frontiers of knowledge but also to applying knowledge to real problems. Most classes are small and taught by fully affiliated faculty members, 80 percent of whom hold the most advanced degrees in their fields. In addition, students gain hands-on experience through a variety of community-based programs, cooperative education, internships, and research projects operated with industry and government.

Over 2,000 of Wright State's students live in university-affiliated residences on or adjacent to the 557-acre main campus. An extensive underground tunnel system links most campus buildings, whose modern architecture is nationally recognized for being completely accessible to people with disabilities. Although most students hold jobs on or off campus, many are involved in one or more of the 150 student clubs and organizations that give vibrancy to campus life.

The university offers 14 Division I intercollegiate athletic programs, and many students participate in intramural sports programs. The Ervin J. Nutter Center, a state-of-the-art sports and entertainment complex, and other recreational facilities are available to students on a daily basis. Besides intercollegiate athletic events, the Nutter Center hosts convocation, concerts, and other cultural and entertainment events, seating up to 12,000.
